

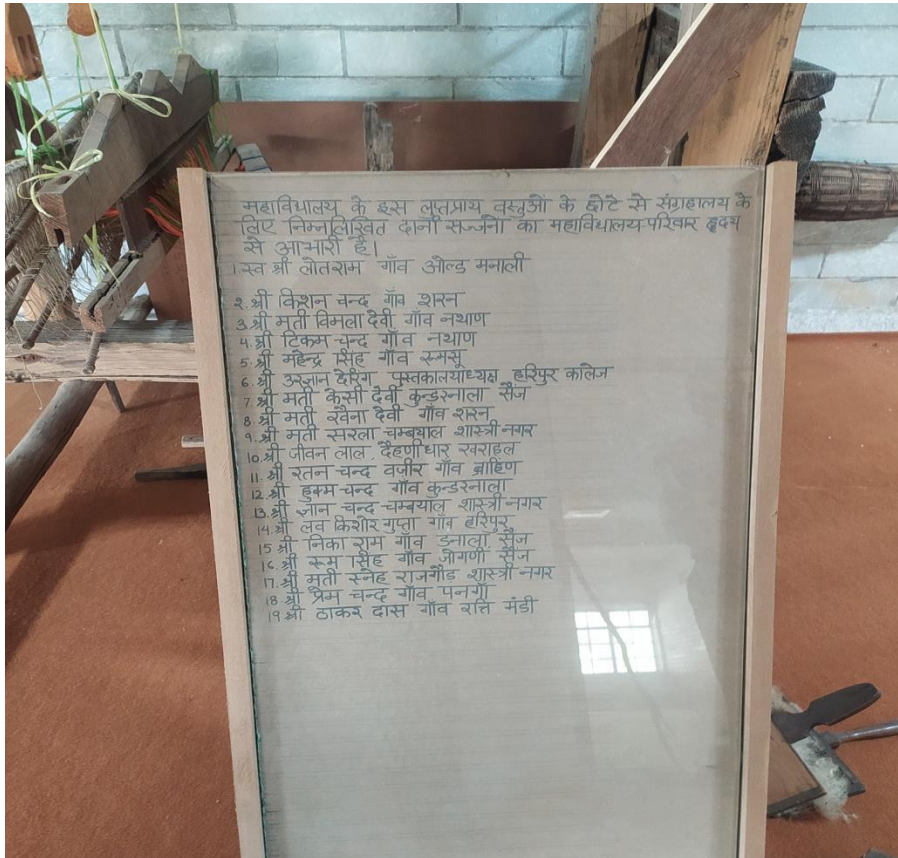
Best Practice 1: Preservation and propagation of culture and heritage

The first best practice that the college follows is of preservation and propagation of culture and heritage. The valley abounds in rich artefacts. A place for a museum where these artefacts could be kept and preserved was established in the entry lounge of the college in Feb 2016. Articles that were used in households that were rare and not in use were collected from Haripur village and various neighbouring villages by the students of the college. A tradition of collecting articles for the museum was kept in practice and various articles were added in the museum in the coming years. Covid restrictions posed as a challenge in continuing this practice. Frequent visits to the nearby villages was put on hold as a need arose to help them in other ways.

Haripur Jach (Fair) was another practice that the college had started that strengthened the ties between college students, teachers and the village community. Women who were a part of the various Mahila Mandals of the village were invited to organise a Jach(Fair) in the college campus. The stalls in the fair gave these women an opportunity to sell local home-made food items like jams, pickles. The fair also helped the women to sell hand-woven warm clothing. The fair provided the women to showcase their talent as well as generate a source of income for them. The college had wanted to pursue this practice but due to restriction on public mass gatherings this practice had to be put on hold. The interaction with village women had brought them close to the college administration and staff. Through the interaction the college staff came to know of many other problems that women face. The staff had resolved to maintain this relationship with the nearby villages and help them in any manner possible.

मास्क बैंक के तहत कार्य कर रही हरिपुर की रेंजर जय ईशा

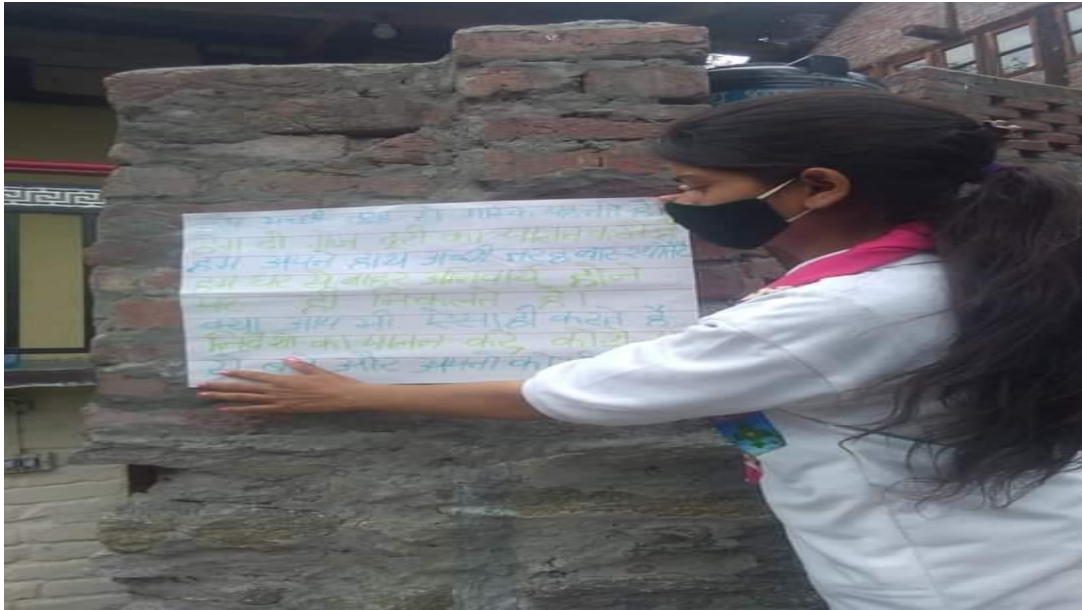


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
